Playing With Your Baby



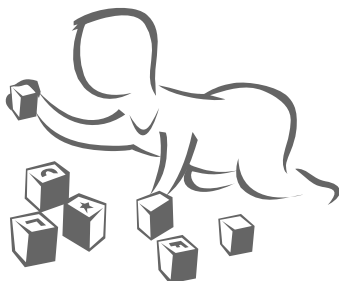

How often should you play with your baby?

- Everyday
- Longer one-to-one time each week
- Make play part of Feeding time

Provide the best environment for play:

- Shut off the television
- Spend time outdoors
- Be sure your baby is in the mood to play
- Put aside household chores



Playtime activity ideas to do together:

0-3 months:

- Cuddle and smile at your baby
- Sing and talk to your baby
- Help your baby to hold onto a rattle

3-6 months:

- Move their arms to music
- Play peek-a-boo
- Hold objects for baby to grasp

6-9 months:

- Repeat baby's noises
- Play "this little piggy"
- Take them for a walk in the stroller

9-12 months:

- Go to the park or playground
- Help them stack blocks
- Dance with your baby

Tips for Parents:

- Don't play rough with your baby
- Play when baby is rested and alert
- Be patient and loving
- Never leave them unsupervised
- Toys with small pieces are a choking hazard for babies
- Never shake or throw your baby
- Play **with** your baby, don't just watch
- Closely follow the recommended age guidelines on toys
